WELCOME...

o those attending the HAC 40th Birthday Dinner, thank you for sharing the night with us. 40 years is a long time in anyone's language, and whether you have been with HAC for most of that time, or are just starting out with us, we hope the night will provide an entertaining insight into what has kept HAC going over the years.

Certainly we have had our ups and downs over the last four decades. From small beginnings, HAC grew to become one of the premier rally clubs in the 1970's, and the HAC Interclub Motorkhana has attracted record field sizes. In leaner times, our membership dropped to less than twenty financial members, and *Cogswapper* and regular meeting nights became casualties. However, unlike many other clubs who have sadly fallen by the wayside, we have managed to keep going, and our 40th Anniversary will hopefully spur a further resurgence in our growth. Thanks to the enthusiastic efforts of Diana-Lee Saville, *Cogswapper* has not missed an issue this year, and this Souvenir Edition is undoubtedly the best yet. Previous *Cogswapper* Editors, Roger Bonhomme (*VACC Journal*) and Allan Edwards (*Auto Action*) have moved on to become full-time professional editors, and hopefully Di will follow in their footsteps.

HAC has a proud history of achievement. Several of our members have become National Champions in their chosen sport. Jeff Beaumont, currently competing in the Classic Adelaide Rally, was Australian Champion Navigator three times with Ross Dunkerton, and has subsequently become Rally Champion in Singapore as a driver in recent years. George Fury was also an Australian Rally Champion, whilst in motorkhanas, Robin Mutimer took out the Australian Championship as a HAC member, before Bill Mc Carthy went on to claim four Australian titles. More recently, Jason Bargwanna scored a memorable FAI 1000 victory at Bathurst in 2000, before finishing a creditable sixth in this year's event.

HAC has also been involved in almost every form of motorsport organisation. In the early days, members traveled around the state to act as flag marshals, stewards, timekeepers and scrutineers at race meetings. Many nights were spent organising rallies, or manning check-points, often in miserable weather conditions. HAC has been represented at almost every level of CAMS administration, and we are very proud that the two CAMS cofounders, Maurice Monk and the late Donald Thomson have been awarded honorary life memberships of HAC. Members have served on State Council, Stewards Panel, Motorkhana Panel and many other Advisory Committees over the years. In the organisation of events we have been innovators, as is shown by the success of the HAC Interclub and the Avalon Autocross. HAC teams have played a key role in the running of the Australian Motorkhana Championship on each of its recent visits to Victoria. Several HAC members have had an active role in the running of the Australian Formula 1 Grand Prix since its return to Melbourne.

Over the years, many friendships have been formed, both between individual members, and through our associations with other clubs. Perhaps it is those friendships that have kept the Club going through the tough times, and it is certainly shown by the enthusiasm for tonight's dinner. For those who couldn't be with us tonight, we look forward to continuing our friendships, in the hope that you may be able to come to our next anniversary.

40 years old!! Who would have thought in those very early days of the Club that HAC would still be going strong 40 years later.

Huntingdale Auto Club was formed 40 years ago by a small group of motoring enthusiasts who joined together to share in their common interest of the fun and excitement offered by the many avenues of motorsport.

The club met monthly, firstly in the local progress hall, before moving to East St Kilda. Guest speakers were invited and film nights were held.

Weekends were taken up with car trials, motorkhanas or treasure hunts. When the club affiliated with CAMS we were invited to compete in similar events run by other clubs.

In the early years of HAC, members competed in club sponsored teams in BP Rallies, Six Hour Relay races and Australian Motorkhana Championships whilst some members have gone on to become professional motorsport competitors. Others have remained at the club level to enjoy the social and competitive aspect amongst fellow competitors.

Huntingdale Auto Club has now widened its horizons and has earned a reputation among other clubs for running well organised events, particularly in the motorkhana area. Sprints, autocrosses and hillclimbs are also areas where our members participate, both as competitors and officials.

The original aim of the club was to promote all types of motorsport at all levels. This holds true to this day as we have the younger members coming through, still feeling their way in competition. The more experienced members of the club are always there to assist and advise those younger, less experienced members.

The club is a member of Group 5; a group of other clubs which provide speed events and a motorkhana series for our members to compete in. HAC annually runs a motorkhana and autocross within the Group 5 series, which are well supported by our members and by members from the other clubs.

The 33rd HAC Interclub Motorkhana will be conducted on December 9th this year. This event has for many years been attracting the best motorkhana drivers in the state. With entry numbers usually reaching around 100, fierce competition is assured in all classes with the club team's competition adding extra interest.

The club has had its ups and downs over the decades, and whilst many other clubs have fallen by the wayside, HAC has renewed enthusiasm with a new committee and an increased membership.


HAC will continue to prosper in the future and I feel proud to be associated with such a club.

Donald Thomson

The late Donald Kingsley Thomson was a co-founder of CAMS, a member of honour of the FIA and widely recognised in all facets of Australian motorsport. National Secretary of CAMS for many years, "DKT" was also Australia's delegate to the FIA for a number of years. A competitor then organiser in early trials and other events, upon retirement Donald happily returned to grass roots motorsport in his Monk constructed Datsun Demon, taking on competitors often more than fifty years younger.

Erik Ruse

Erik is HAC's longest constant member along with Geoff Dennis and served for many years on the committee as Competition Secretary. Eric organised the first of HAC's motorkhana/fun run days as well as rallies through the Dandenongs. Although Erik has contributed much to officiating and organising he also competed in a Triumph Herald and later in his XP Falcon Hardtop in many club events.

An initial foundation member, Geoff

An initial foundation member, Geoff was President from 1964 – 1969 and edited Cogswapper for three years. Geoff was made HAC's first Life Member for his services to the club.

Geoff Dennis

Geoff was active in all facets of competition but particularly hillclimbs and open races where he powered his Austin Healey Special, Sprite, Spitfire and GT6 to several successes. Geoff also became the first HAC member to be elected to the CAMS Board of Management and helped initiate the Motorkhana Panel.

Maurice was co-founder of CAMS along with Donald Thomson. Maurice is the holder of the CAMS Award of Merit for his contribution to motorsport as a competitor, organiser and administrator. He was the first President of CAMS in 1953 and

the first President of CAMS in 1953 and also served as President again in 1956. Over a period of years, Maurice constructed a line of some 17 competition cars, capable of competing in motorsport events ranging from mud-trials to sprints and hillclimbs. These were particularly successful in the hands of Maurice and other members of his family.

HAC was proud to bestow Life Memberships on the two founders of CAMS, in recognition of their genuine support of club motorsport.



John Rosengrave

John has been a member of HAC since 1965 and has given many years of service to the club, having held most of the executive positions on the committee. John has competed in all forms of motorsport including BP Rallies in a VW Beetle and then in his Morris Nomad

which was bought partly from his winnings in the 1970 Castrol Safety Drive. Motorkhanas are now his main interest and a variety of VW Golf's have led to many class wins in both Australian and Victorian championship events. In 1995 John was awarded the CAMS Service Award. This award was presented to John for his continuous service to the club and motorsport in general. Within a year of joining HAC John was elected to the committee and has served continuously to this day as either




President, Secretary, Magazine Editor and delegate to the CAMS State Council. John has served on the State Motorkhana Panel since its inception in 1972 and has also been the Victorian delegate on the National Motorkhana Committee since 1975.

During the year 2000, in recognition of John's services to motorsport he was awarded the Australian Sports Medal. This medal was awarded to commemorate Australian Sporting achievement and has been established as a commemorate award within the Australian honours system.







Griffiths (Honda Special) was leading until hitting a


flag on his





final test, which dropped him to third behind David Collier (NSW -Renault Special) and the winner. Highest placed Victorian was State Champion, Richard Carlson, whilst PIARC's Warren Reid and Phil Torode (PCCV) were the only other Victorians to score class wins.

Overall the event ran very well, with the 75 competitors all completing their nine tests before 4 pm, and allowing plenty of time to relax before an enjoyable Presentation Dinner at the Coolaroo Taverner Hotel. Due to its assistance with the event, HAC is set to get a share of the event profits,



the remainder of which will be put towards buying some sets of the excellent PIARC timing equipment similar to that used at this year's event.

John Rosengrave was introduced to HAC in early in 1965 by a school friend, John Spain. Together they attended a motorkhana at Berwick airfield. The friend in a Mini won the event, whilst JR was (almost) last, in a field of over eighty. Aha, more practise was needed. So began a long and very enjoyable time covering most facets of motorsport. JR joined the HAC Committee shortly after that first event, and still remains today. After marrying Jenny in 1971, the pair have become regular attendees at many motorsport events, or working behind the scenes.

The early days involved stints as a flag marshal (HAC generally got the Winton rounds, whilst the VADC handled the new Calder and Sandown venues), scrutineering and assisting with rallies as well as competing in as many sprints, rallies and motorkhanas as possible. After a time as HAC secretary, he became President for the first time in 1974, and joined the Victorian Motorkhana Panel and the National Motorkhana Committee in the early seventies. JR has competed in every Australian Motorkhana championship event since 1973, except for last year. A serious road accident accident in May 2000 meant he was unable to compete, but he travelled to Old. for the event and registered as an official. Founding the HAC Interclub Motorkhana in 1969 was one of his proudest achievements, only surpassed by a CAMS Service medal in 1995 and an Australian Sports Award in 2000 for services to motorsport.
